The best way to reach your saving goal is to start with a budget. A budget helps you keep track of the money you have coming in -- your allowance or birthday money -- and the money you have going out, including spending, saving and possibly donating. SHORT-TERM SAVING:

30 percent of your income, or \$3 for every \$10.

You may need to save several months for larger purchases, such as a video game or an iPad. This jar will help you save for some cool stuff!

LONG-TERM SAVING:

30 percent of your income, or \$3 for every \$10.

This is where you'll save for the future. Someday you'll want to go to college or buy a car. These expenses require a lot of planning and saving!

Once your money has started to add up, ask a parent or trusted adult to help you open a savings account at BankTennessee.

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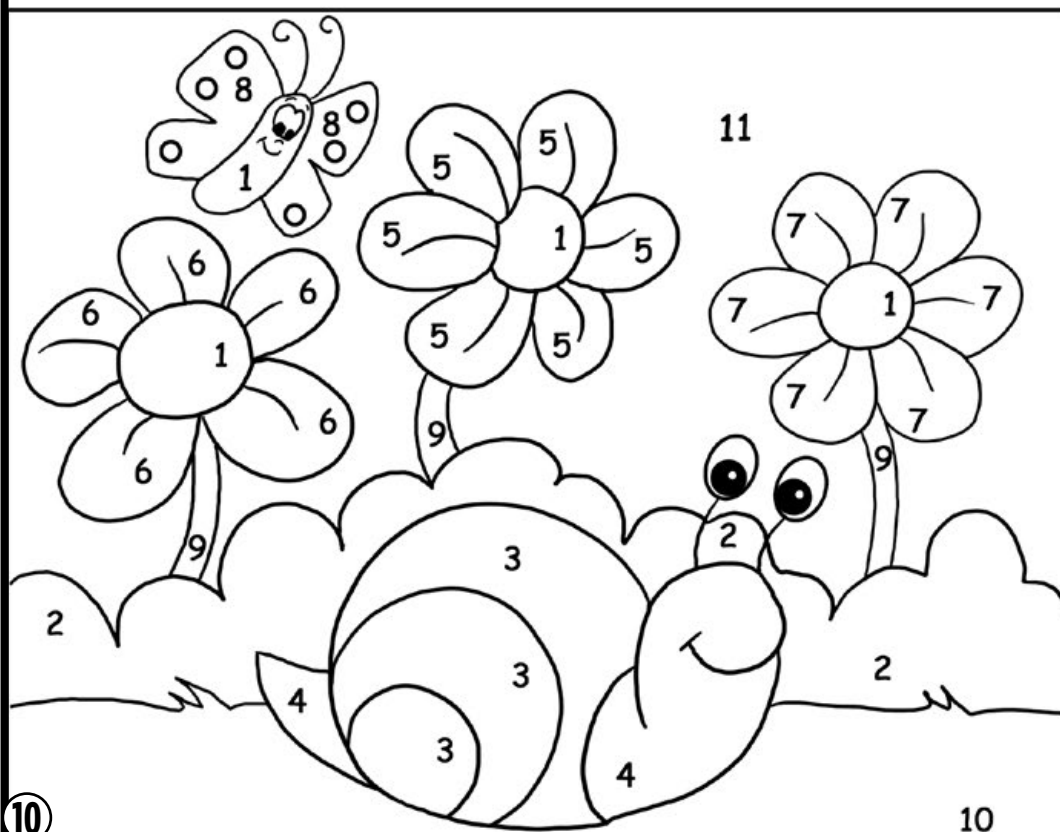
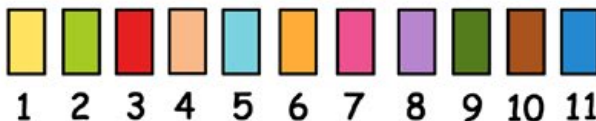

Spring Cleaning Tips for Including the Kids

Here are some inspiring ideas for cleaning with kids:

The weather's getting warmer, birds are chirping, flowers are blooming – and you're likely holding a mile-long spring cleaning list. Spring cleaning holds many benefits. If you or anyone in your family suffers from allergies, ridding the house of lingering dust, mold and pollen can bring some relief. Spring cleaning reduces the bacteria you live with, resulting in a healthier environment. Plus, after a season of family gatherings, indoor activities, holiday gifts and school projects, you're probably craving a little fresher air and open space inside your home.

But should you have to tackle these projects alone?

No! Most children can handle some extra chores, and the benefits of spring cleaning for kids include more family time, increased physical activity and the opportunity to learn a few new skills. Plus, spring cleaning with kids can make jobs that seem tedious faster and more fun -- so get ready to dole out the (age-appropriate) duties.

Here are some inspiring ideas for cleaning with kids:

Let them choose their chores. If your spring cleaning crew includes more than one child, plus parent participants, write jobs on index cards or paper, fold them and ask everyone to choose from a hat or jar. Or, create a chore wheel and spin for your task. Random selection cuts down on arguments.

Divide and conquer. If you're laundering and storing winter clothes, assign someone to transfer clothes from the washer to dryer to table or bed, another to fold, and another to pack them neatly in boxes or tubs. If you're cleaning a living room or bedroom, ask your oldest to vacuum while younger siblings put away toys or dust furniture and window sills.

Tackle one at a time. Trying to clean the kitchen, bedrooms and bathrooms simultaneously is sure to cause undue stress among your broom-wielding brood. Take spring cleaning one space at a time before you move on to another. Kids will enjoy seeing the results of their hard work.

Inspire kindness.

If your house is overflowing with new clothes or toys, talk to your kids about donating their old items to less fortunate children. Most will be glad to know they're helping someone their own age.

Add a soundtrack.

Play upbeat music to keep the kids motivated. Let each child pick a song, and see how much faster the scrubbing, polishing and organizing seems to go.

Reward their efforts.

When the work is done, you'll all be tired but satisfied. Celebrate your clean sweep with a pizza night, family movie or other fun activity.

APRIL TOPIC: ALLERGIES

Spring is here and with its arrival comes a variety of seasonal allergies. In the United States, allergies and asthma typically begin in childhood and are the most common chronic diseases for children.

- It's estimated that about 50 million people in the U.S. have allergies. That translates to 1 in every 5 people.
- The most common form of allergy is allergic rhinitis or "hay fever".
- Asthma affects over 17 million Americans and 1/4 of these cases are children under the age of 18 years.
- Inheritance of allergies can be familial. If one parent has allergies, the risk for a child in that family having allergies is 25%. If both parents have allergies, the risk for children is 60-70%.

How are allergies defined?

Allergies are usually thought of as bodily reactions caused by an overactive immune system. Depending on the "target organ" involved, these reactions can affect the upper respiratory tract (hay fever, sinusitis), the lower respiratory tract (asthma) or the skin (eczema, hives). Normally the immune system protects the body from foreign invaders like viruses and bacteria. In allergic states, the immune system overreacts against normally benign substances like pollens, dust, animal danders and certain foods. Even the skin can be sensitized to topical substances, a very common one being nickel alloys in some jewelry.

What are suspect signs of allergy?

- Itchy, runny eyes
- Chronic itchy nose and sniffing
- Sneezing and dry cough
- Recurrent wheezing or difficult breathing
- Itchy or tingling mouth and throat
- Itchy red skin in patches that persist
- Hives which appear as itchy skin eruptions lasting a short time and moving from place to place over the body

If your child displays any of these worrisome symptoms, bring them to the attention of your pediatrician or family physician. There are many screening tests which can be safely done in deciding whether a qualified allergist should be involved in further diagnosis and treatment.

How to tell the difference between a cold and an allergy:

It may at times be difficult to distinguish between a common cold and a respiratory allergy. A lingering "cold" may actually be an allergy like "hay fever" which peaks in the spring months of April and May in the mid-south region. This type of allergy coincides with the resurgence of grasses in March and blooming plants and trees during March and April.

Typical signs of "hay fever" are: clear, watery nasal discharge, itchy eyes and nose plus spasmodic sneezing. Fever is never a sign of allergy, but almost always suggests an infection. Antibiotics will not help allergies or a common cold. A plain head cold usually lasts no more than seven days after which it resolves gradually on its own; allergy symptoms usually go on or recur for weeks or months.
